PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Demolition No. 368** to demolish an approximately 1,584 square foot detached garage over 50 years of age located at 1376 Pacific Street within the R-E, Residential Estate District (APN: 0175-192-05-0000). This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301(I) (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines.

PROPOSAL

The applicant, Leonard and Carol Ingalls, has submitted an application to demolish an existing 1,584 square foot detached garage located at 1376 Pacific Street within the R-E, Residential Estate zoning district (APN: 0175-192-05-0000). The existing garage is over 50 years of age. The applicant proposes to construct a new garage that is approximately 1,572 square feet with a new 208 square foot covered patio. The property is currently developed as a single-family residence.

BACKGROUND

Photographs provided by the applicant shows that the existing garage is a 3 car garage. The applicant is proposing to demolish the existing garage in order to construct a new garage. Staff was not able to locate the original building permits for the construction of a 1,584 square foot garage. The building permit history for this property includes a building permit for the construction a 528 square foot garage issued on December 29, 1945, a permit for the construction of a 396 square foot carport issued on July 6, 1955, and a permit for a 308 square foot attached carport to the existing residence granted on October 13, 1958. Historic aerial images shows the presence of a detached structure that has a similar layout as the existing garage in the 1959 aerial image. Information provided by the applicant indicates that the garage was constructed in 1946. Staff is not able to confirm when the original structure was constructed. Based on historic aerial images the structure is over 50 years of age.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

City staff prepared a Preliminary Environmental Checklist for the proposed project in accordance with Section 15.44.060 of the Redlands Municipal Code which requires an environmental checklist be prepared for all demolition permit applications involving structures over 50 years old. This checklist provides an environmental analysis of the project that confirms that, with the Commission's concurrence that the structure is not considered a "historic resources" nor an "eligible resource," that demolition of the structure would qualify for a Notice of Exemption pursuant to Section 15301 of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines.

Section 15301(I) of the California Environmental Quality Act states that the demolition and removal of individual small structures including accessory structures, is exempt from environmental review. In addition, Section 15064.5 of the California Environmental Quality Act refers to the California Public Resource Code, which provides guidance as to what is considered a "historic resource" or "eligible resource". The criteria consists of the following:

- It is associated with events which have made a significant contribution to California's history and cultural heritage.
- It is associated with the lives of persons important to our past.
- The architecture embodies distinctive characteristics of a type, period, region, or method of construction or possesses high artistic values.
- The potential to yield any information important to history or pre-history.

After conducting research on the subject parcel, staff concluded that there is no evidence that the site or structure is associated with any historical event or person that contributes to the history of the United States, California, San Bernardino County, or the City of Redlands. In addition, the structure does not embody any distinctive characteristics of a type, period, region, method of construction or high artistic value, nor does the structure present any potential to yield any information important to history or pre-history. Further details of this analysis are included in the Preliminary Environmental Checklist Form (Attachment C).

ANALYSIS

The building permits on file for this property do not have records of any permits issued for the construction of the detached garage. There are some inconsistencies in the year the property was built, but the property is indeed over 50 years of age. As indicated above, the building permits on file for this property do not indicate the year the garage was constructed. There are several building permits associated with the subject property including several plumbing permits, electrical permits, grading permits, a building permit for a room addition issued on July 24, 1956, and a building permit for the construction of a 3,000 square foot single-family dwelling issued on August 27, 1991. Based on aerial images, the garage was constructed sometime between 1938 and 1959, and the structure is over 50 years of age. The Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps do not cover that portion of the City; however, historic aerials shows the location of the existing detached garage in 1959.

The procedures outlined in RMC Section 2.24.090 through Section 2.24.140 apply to the demolition of property recorded in the City of Redlands List of Historic Resources. The

subject property is not recorded in the list of local historic resources and is not subject to the procedures in Section 2.24 of the Redlands Municipal Code (RMC). However, RMC Section 15.44.070 requires that prior to the demolition of any structure over 50 years old, the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission is required to determine whether the structure is historically significant. RMC Section 2.62.170 establishes the City's criteria for historic significance. Below, each City criteria is listed with justification as to why this structure is not historically significant.

Local Criteria for Significance

RMC Section 2.62.170(A): It has significant character, interest, or value as part of the development, heritage or cultural characteristics of the City of Redlands, State of California, or the United States.

Response: Historic aerial photographs shows the garage present on the property in the 1959 aerial photograph. The original building permit for the construction of the garage was not found in the city's building permit history. Based on research conducted at the A.K. Smiley Library's Heritage Room and through newspaper.com there is no evidence that the construction or utilization of this accessory structure had value as part of the development, heritage, or cultural characteristics of the City, State or County.

RMC Section 2.62.170(B): It is the site of a significant historic event.

Response: Based on the research conducted by staff through local and regional newspaper database searches, building records, and ownership history, it has been determined that the land on which the building is located is not the site of a significant historic event. No information was found associated with significant events related to this structure.

RMC Section 2.62.170(C): It is strongly identified with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the culture, history or development of the city.

Response: Staff conducted research at the A.K. Smiley Library Heritage Room and through newspaper.com. The property was originally 1360 Pacific Street and was renumbered to 1376 Pacific Street around 1974 to 1975. The property first appeared in the phone book in 1975. The table (as shown below) lists the residents associated with the primary dwelling based on the information provided by the City Directories and phone books located at the A.K. Smiley Library's Heritage Room.

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A newspaper article dated March 10, 1973 indicated that Lupe P. Cardoza was the owner and operator of Lupe's Azteca Inn on W. Redlands Blvd for the about 25 years and died in San Bernardino at the age of 72. Lupe P. Cardoza was a resident of Redlands for about 57 years and had three brothers and a sister. In addition, a newspaper article from May 1, 1982 indicated that James and Blanche Colton was the chairperson for a potluck dinner that took place at the First Presbyterian Church in John Knox Hall. The newspaper research that was conducted for each individual revealed no significant information.

RMC Section 2.62.170(D): It is one of the few remaining examples in the City possessing distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type or specimen.

Response: The detached garage is located at the rear of the subject property and has a simplistic design with a hipped roof. The garage accommodates up to three cars, has wood siding along the northeast portion, vinyl windows along the northwest portion, and brick along the northwest and a small portion along the southwest. The garage appears to have been modified throughout the years and includes a small covered patio at the southwest corner of the structure and doors for ingress and egress. Overall, the existing garage is not one of the few remaining examples in the City possessing distinguishing characteristics of this architectural type or specimen.

RMC Section 2.62.170(E): It is a notable work of an architect or master builder whose individual work has significantly influenced the development of the city.

Response: A local and regional newspaper records database search was conducted for the garage. The city's building permit does not have information regarding the specific year the garage was construction nor does it indicate the designer or builder of the structure. However, given the limited architectural features of the building, it can be reasonably assumed that the structure is not the notable work of an architect or master builder whose individual work has significantly influenced the development of the City.

RMC Section 2.62.170(F): It embodies elements of architectural design, detail, materials, or craftsmanship that represents a significant architectural innovation.

Response: As discussed under Section 2.62.170.D above, the detached garage does not embody elements of architectural design, details, materials or craftsmanship that represents a significant architectural innovation. The primarily dwelling has characteristics of Victoria architecture. The garage has a utilitarian design and has been utilized for vehicular storage purposes. The garage includes wood siding along the northeast corner of the building and brick along the northwest and a small portion along the southwest with a composition shingle roof. Overall, the garage does not have a unique design that distinguishes this property from other properties within the city.

RMC Section 2.62.170(G): It has a unique location or singular physical characteristics representing an established and familiar visual feature of a neighborhood, community, or the city.

Response: The garage is located at the rear of the main residence. At the time the existing single-family residence was developed the subject property was surrounded by orchards and there were scattered single-family residential homes within the vicinity of the subject property. The surrounding property has now been developed with single-family residential dwellings. The property is not located within a unique location and the garage is not a familiar visual feature of the neighborhood, community, or city. The surrounding properties are as follows:

The site is not located within any registered Historic and Scenic Districts and is not listed as a designated historic resource.

RMC Section 2.62.170(H): It has unique design or detailing.

Response: The garage has a utilitarian design and is approximately 1,584 square feet in size. The garage has wood siding with a light grey finish along the northeast elevation with a composition shingle roof. The garage appears to have been modified over the past several years and does not have unique architectural features that are included in the design. The design of the garage has common features that are not unique to the overall design of the subject property.

RMC Section 2.62.170(I): It is a particularly good example of a period or style.

Response: The detached garage does not represent a good example of a period or style. The accessory structures was constructed as a garage and has been utilized as a garage ancillary to the existing single-family residential dwelling. At the time the garage was constructed it was surrounded by scattered single-family residential homes, orchards, and vacant land. The city has a wide variety of accessory structures that illustrate a better

example of the period or style. The overall design of the garage is simple and has a utilitarian design. The City's Historic Context Statement indicates that the bar of significance would be significantly higher; therefore, the structure which has limited unique architectural features would not be considered a particular good example or one of the best examples of this style within Redlands.

RMC Section 2.62.170(J): It contributes to the historical or scenic heritage or historical or scenic properties of the city (to include, but not be limited to, landscaping, light standards, trees, curbing, and signs).

Response: The detached garage does not contribute in any way to a group of historic or scenic properties within the City. The existing landscape on the subject property includes grass within the front yard and a solid hedge row along the northern and western portion of the property. The existing features that are present on the subject property including the landscaping, driveways, curbs, etc. will remain on the property. No light standards, curbing or signs that could be considered significant are present on site.

RMC Section 2.62.170(K): It is located within a historic and scenic or urban conservation district, being a geographically definable area possessing a concentration of historic or scenic properties which contribute to each other and are unified aesthetically by plan or physical development.

Response: Refer to the response under 2.62.170(J) above. The site is not located within any historic district.

CEQA Criteria for Significance

In addition to the City of Redlands criteria, California Public Resources Code Section 5024.1 (Title 14 CCR, Section 4852) also has findings for determining if a building has "Historic Significance." Each of those findings is identified within the Preliminary Environmental Checklist Form (Attachment C) with justification as to why this structure is not historically significant.

A. Associated with events have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of California History and cultural heritage.

A thorough record search of local newspapers and building permit records did not indicate that this structure is associated with any specific events that may have contributed to California's history or cultural heritage.

B. Is associated with the lives of persons important in our past.

Please refer to the response provided under Section 2.62.170(C) above. The detached garage is not associated with the lives of persons important in our past given that it was primarily used for vehicle storage.

C. Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, region, or method of construction, or represents the work of an important creative individual, or possesses high artistic values.

Please refer to the response provided under Section 2.62.170(D) above. The structure does not embody distinctive characteristics of any type, period, region, or method of construction, nor does it represent the work of an important creative individual, nor possess high artistic values.

D. Has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information in prehistory or history.

The existing garage has not yielded any information regarding prehistory or history. Based on the review of the criteria above as it relates to the demolition of the structure, it is not historically significant, and approval of the proposed garage demolition will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource as defined in §15064.5.

Conclusion of Analysis

Based on the listed criteria and their associated responses, staff has determined the detached garage is not considered historically significant.

The Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission is authorized to determine the potential historical significance of the structure and the need for any further environmental review, and subsequently approve, condition or deny the demolition permit application. If the Commission determines that the structure has no historical significance and the permit application is approved, the application is exempt from further review by the City unless an appeal is made to the City Council. If no appeal is filed within the time provided, the Development Services Department may issue the demolition permit in accordance with the Redlands Municipal Code.

If the Commission determines that the structure has historical significance, the Commission would then direct staff to conduct additional environmental review and subsequently approve, condition, or deny the application.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission approve Demolition No. 368 based on the facts presented in this staff report and subject to the

recommended Conditions of Approval.

MOTION

If the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission deems it appropriate, staff recommends the following motion:

"I move that the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission adopt Resolution No. 2022-09, to determine that Demolition Permit No. 368 is exempt from environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines, and approve Demolition Permit No. 368 based on the facts within this staff report and subject to the Conditions of Approval."

EVALUATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS:

- a) No Impact. The proposed project will not have an adverse effect on a scenic vista or scenic highway. The proposed project is the demolition of a detached garage which is not located within a scenic vista or along a scenic highway.
- b) No Impact. The proposed project will not damage scenic resources, including trees, rock outcroppings, or historic buildings within a state scenic highway. The property is not located along a state scenic highway and the structure itself is not historic. The structure to be demolished will be a garage, and there is no known rock outcropping on-site.

Cultural Resources - Discussion

- a) No Impact. The historical significance of the project has been reviewed pursuant to the findings of Public Resources Code Section 5024.1, Title 14 CCR, Section 4852) which are as follow.
 - A. Associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of California History and cultural heritage.

There are no building permits on file related to the original year the garage was constructed. Therefore, the exact date of construction for the garage could not be determined, but the garage is indeed over fifty (50) years of age. Historic aerial images shows what appears to be the placement of the garage in the 1959 aerial photograph. A search of local newspapers and permits did not associate this property with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad pattern of California History and cultural heritage given that the structure was utilized as a garage.

B. Is associated with the lives of persons important in our past.

No impact. The proposed structure to be demolished will be a detached garage. The structure is not associated with the lives of persons important in our past since individuals did not live within the premises of this structure.

C. Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, region, or method of construction, or represents the work of an important creative individual, or possesses high artistic values.

The existing detached garage has a simplistic design and appears to have been modified throughout the years. The garage includes wood siding along the northeast portion, vinyl windows along the northwest portion, and brick along the northwest and a small portion

along the southwest. The garage also includes a small covered patio towards the southwest corner and doors for ingress and egress. The garage is located at the rear of the main residence and is not visible from the public right-of-way. The conditions of the garage have deteriorated over the years and the applicant proposes to demolish this structure and construct a new garage in accordance with the Redlands Municipal Code requirements. The garage is utilitarian and does not present any distinctive characteristics that represent the work of any important creative individual nor does it possesses high artistic values.

D. Has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information in prehistory or history.

The garage has not yielded any information regarding prehistory or history. Based on the review of the criteria above as it relates to the demolition of the structure, the structure is not historically significant and approval of the proposed project will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource as defined in §15064.5.

- b) No Impact. The structure has not yielded any information regarding prehistory or history. The building will not likely yield information about the past. Therefore, approval of the proposed project will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of an archaeological resource pursuant to §15064.5.

A RESOLUTION OF THE HISTORIC AND SCENIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF REDLANDS APPROVING DEMOLITION NO. 368, TO DEMOLISH AN APPROXIMATELY 1,584 SQUARE FOOT DETACHED GARAGE OVER 50 YEARS OF AGE, LOCATED AT 1376 PACIFIC STREET IN THE R-E, RESIDENTIAL ESTATE DISTRICT (APN: 0175-192-05-0000).

WHEREAS, the applicant, Leonard and Carol Ingalls, has submitted an application for Demolition No. 368 to demolish an approximately 1,584 square foot detached garage over 50 years of age, located at 1376 Pacific Street within the R-E, Residential Estate District (APN: 0175-192-05-0000).

EXHIBIT A CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL DEMOLITION NO. 368

- 1. This approval is to demolish an approximately 1,584 square foot detached garage over 50 years of age located at 1376 Pacific Street within the R-E, Residential Estate District (APN: 0175-192-05-0000).
- 2. Prior to demolition, a building permit shall be obtained from the Development Services Department.
- 3. Prior to the issuance of a building permit to demolish the garage, the applicant is required to have approved plans for the construction of a new detached garage.
- 4. A new garage shall be constructed on the subject property in accordance with Chapter 18.164 (Parking and Loading Space Requirements) of the Redlands Municipal Code.
- 5. The issuance of any permits shall comply with all provisions of the Redlands Municipal Code, including Section 15.44 which regulates the demolition of structures.
- 6. Unless demolition has commenced pursuant to a building permit, this application shall expire in eighteen (18) months from the approval date.
- 7. All demolition activities shall be limited to the hours from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday and prohibited on Sundays and Federal Holidays.
- 8. The applicant for this permit, and its successors and assigns, shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City of Redlands, and its elected officials, officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, actions, and proceedings to attack, set aside, void or annul the approval of this permit by the City, or brought against the City due to acts or omissions in any way connected to the applicant's project that is the subject of this permit. This indemnification shall include, but not be limited to, damages, fees, costs, liabilities, and expenses incurred in such actions or proceedings, including damages for the injury to property or persons, including death of a person, and any award of attorneys' fees. In the event any such action is commenced to attack, set aside, void or annul all, or any, provisions of this permit, or is commenced for any other reason against the City for acts or omissions relating to the applicant's project, within fourteen (14) City business days of the same, the applicant shall file with the City a performance bond or irrevocable letter of credit (together, the "Security") in a form and in an amount satisfactory to the City, to ensure applicant's performance of its defense and indemnity obligations under this condition. The failure of the applicant to provide the Security shall be deemed an express acknowledgement and agreement by the applicant that the City shall have the authority and right, without

objection by the applicant, to revoke all entitlements granted for the project pursuant to this permit. The City shall have no liability to the applicant for the exercise of City's right to revoke this permit.
